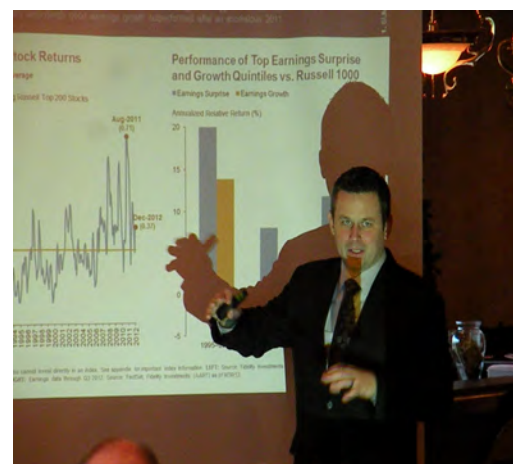
### Winter Luncheon

My father was the JCI branch manager in Charlotte for 25+ years, and I have fond memories of helping him in the shop, going on service calls, and begging for his extra notepads and mechanical pencils. I attached a picture of my brown notepad cover (I also have a blue one), and a picture of his Johnson Controls mechanic's toolkit - something every good pneumatic engineer should have. It's over 50 years old, and I still use it from time to time around the house.

If replacement notepads can't be re-ordered, I guess I'll just have to hoard the ones I have left. But those are wonderful "old school" pads, and I'd definitely order more if I could.

**I Remember Johnson Service Company  
Now Johnson Controls  
1941 – 1983

I would like to share with you a little history of our company during my time spent there.

I was hired in 1941 by R.J. Murphy, the Vice President of Johnson Service, after graduating from Concordia College, Milwaukee, WI. How many of you can say that? My job was office boy. As part of my job, each day on my way to work, I picked up the mail from the main Milwaukee Post Office across the street and put the bag on the desk of Vice President R.J. Murphy. He and the head accountant would go through all of the mail and sort it. I would then take it to the various departments. Remember, our 7-story building at 507 E. Michigan Street housed all of the manufacturing. Starting at the top: 7<sup>th</sup> floor was the brass foundry with some engineering; 6<sup>th</sup> floor was plating and engraving; 5<sup>th</sup> floor was assembly for thermostats; 4<sup>th</sup> floor was our storeroom (locked at all times), 3<sup>rd</sup> floor housed the machine shop; and the 2<sup>nd</sup> housed more machine shop plus the valve and damper assembly. We are now down to the first floor, the Milwaukee Area Branch Office, where A.J. Otto had his office. His brother Carl, the Chief Engineer, had his office on the sixth floor. Sometimes the company was referred to as the Otto Company as the two brothers ran it.

Remember, through the years our company grew with purchases of other plants, such as the one on the northeast side of Milwaukee, the Humboldt Plant, a move to Georgetown, KY, and then a move to Mexico for manufacturing to bring the cost down. During the 70's, there was the purchase of Globe Union for the manufacture of batteries.

During my days at Johnson, WWII interrupted my time. I was drafted and sent to the Army. I qualified for Officer Candidate School at Camp

Davis and graduated from there. Then I found myself on the way to Europe to serve under General Patton in the 3<sup>rd</sup> army. After the war I returned to Johnson Service in various positions. When I retired, I was the Head of Production Planning for the T400 thermostat.

Come Christmas time, the parties were what I remember well. I would start on the 6<sup>th</sup> floor and work my way down, having a few spirits on each floor, enjoying the company and quite in the spirit by the bottom floor. Merry Christmas!

**HERO**

How many of us get to meet our sports heroes? Lou Davit did just that when he met one of his tennis heroes - legend Andre Agassi – at a school opening last July. Agassi was in Milwaukee for the opening of the North Point Lighthouse Charter School in the Thurston Woods neighborhood. This school is the second of 20 that he hopes to open by the start of the 2013-14 school year. Andre is an eloquent speaker and was joined on the stage by Mayor Tom Barrett and others.

Lou brought along a poster of Agassi when he was in his prime and had hair – lots of it! Lou's son, Chris, had had that poster in his room since he was a teenager. The poster was a "hit" of sorts – lots of people taking pictures and videos of it. They didn't know Andre when he was the world's number one tennis player, the only player to ever win all four grand slams in the same year with a total of eight slams over several years, and also win the Olympic Gold Medal in 1996.

That enthusiasm for tennis has turned into a passion for Agassi where education for underprivileged students in urban neighborhoods is concerned. He started the Andre Agassi Foundation for Education in 1994, inspired by others in the network of "no excuse", high-performing charter schools.

By the way, Chris Davit is now a tennis pro in Jackson Hole, WY, and his poster is autographed.

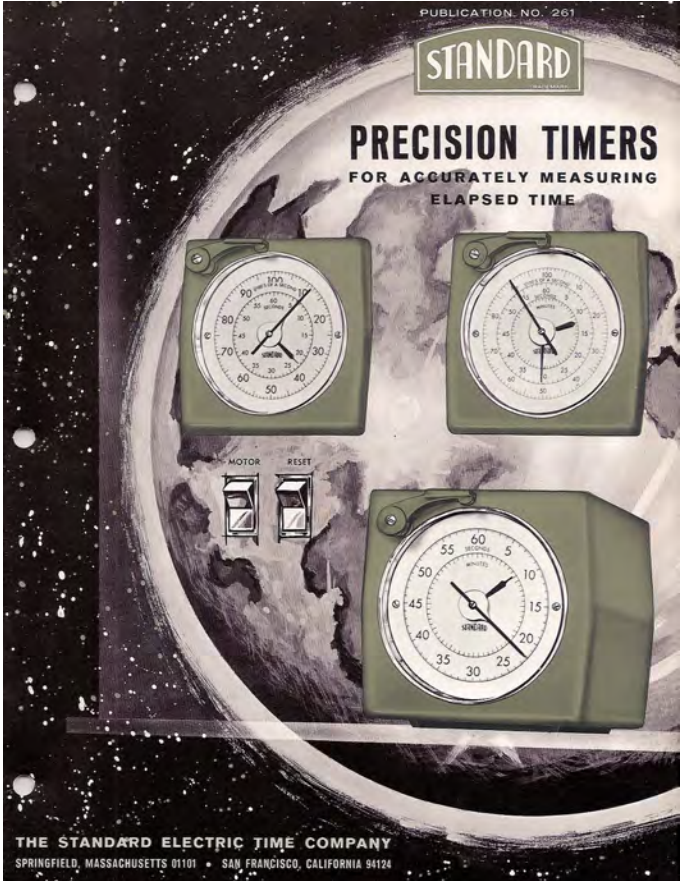




# From the archives...

## Standard Electric Time Company purchased, December 30, 1967

*The Springfield Union* (Springfield, Massachusetts' newspaper) from **December 30, 1967** reported on the sale of the Standard Electric Time Company to Johnson Service Company (Johnson Controls' former name). The article went on to state that Standard Electric (a maker of specialized electrical control and clock systems) would operate as a subsidiary of Johnson and would retain the present management team, headed by Mrs. Frances Riggs-Young as president, and Scott C. Jordan as vice-president and general manager. Unusual for the time was the fact that Standard Electric was headed by a woman. Frances Riggs-Young, widow of the company founder, was a pioneer of sorts, having served for many years as Standard Electric's top executive during an era characterized by a paucity of women in executive positions. Johnson Controls subsequently sold Standard Electric (in 1978) to Faraday, Inc., of Tecumseh, Michigan.
