Our January program was about Wisconsin's Ice Age Trail. It runs from Door County south through the Northern and Southern Kettle Moraine, through Janesville. It turns north past Madison to Langlade County then west to the Mississippi. The trail is 1000 miles long, follows the edge of the last glacier in Wisconsin and is a non-motorized foot path.

In the 1950's an attorney started the idea of a 1000 mile National Park. Henry Reuss's vision was that the trail should be built and maintained by volunteers not government. There are currently 24 volunteer chapters along the trail who are responsible for the trail maintenance.

Today there are about 600 miles of trail. Land is being acquired in partnership with the National Park Service and Department of National Resources. Government and private grants, corporate support, and individual contributions are used to fund the land purchases need to achieve the goal of 1000 miles of off road Ice Age Trail.

Tom Remembers

In my last column, I did not mention that when I returned to the then Johnson Service Company in 1966 my supervisor was Frank Schoen. Frank was the Manager of Value Engineering and was about to retire. Frank had extensive model shop, manufacturing, and machine shop experience. He was a source of endless interesting stories related to Johnson (like making Zippo cigarette lighter parts during World War II). After retirement, Frank was retained by Johnson as a consultant on the Thermo Louver Project. Frank often joked that he was paid more as a consultant than he had earned as an employee. Johnson was fabricating Thermo Louvers as a subcontractor. Thermo Louvers were large (about six inches wide and many feet high) aluminum vertical Venetian blinds with cooling or heating water flowing thru a hole down the center of each one. There were rotating seal problems, expansion/contraction problems, anodized finish problems, and installation problems. Frank earned his money. Prior to coming to this country, Frank was involved in his family's the beer making business and had many interesting stories to tell. His favorite stories revolved around his summer home in Eagle River, Wisconsin (fishing and the boat house). There was a lot of talk; but little fishing and the boathouse was a multi-year process.

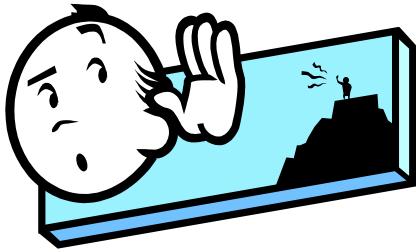
