Jeanne Gruber is a long-time volunteer at Ronald McDonald House. The House was opened 21 years ago. There are 25 guest rooms in the main house and 8 apartments in the long term care wing. It is a non-profit entity that serves families with seriously ill children. Families must have a referral from a hospital in order to stay at the House. If guest families are able to make a donation, the suggested amount is \$10 per evening.

There are over 400 volunteers and staff that attend to the needs of guest families. Some of the volunteer opportunities include office work, light housekeeping, and van driving. A one-year commitment is requested for a minimum of one three-hour shift, every other week.


The President's Page



FIELD REPORTS

King Schultz - International Division

Enjoyed your last newsletter very much, particularly the Seymour Johnson bit. Thought readers might like to know a bit more....

After I retired and moved to Southern California I followed up a Seymour invitation He invited me to bring my granddaughter for a visit on the day the RR club would be there. There were miles of narrow gauge track, plus a roundhouse, a marshalling yard, and a turntable. Much of this was dual track, such that trains could be opposite traveling in directions and distanced apart by a dispatcher. The switches in the marshalling yard were powered by D-251 piston operators. On this particular day, the RR club arrived with their rolling stock in the back of trucks and vans. A special hydraulic lift was used to lower the trains down from the trucks to the tracks. Usually there were numerous operating simultaneously. There was one narrow gauge diesel locomotive painted PINK. When I asked about this, it was explained that it belonged to Ginny Johnson (Seymour's wife) and that he was very sensitive about the color and not to talk to him about it!

Separately, Seymour had procured a full set of drawings of a Baldwin Steam Locomotive. He scaled them down and over 20 years built each piece of the locomotive you see here. This was much wider gauge such that two people could sit side by side in his cars, a opposed to tandem seating in the smaller trains. The picture of Seymour and me was him explaining many details to me.

He made wood forms, used them to cast parts in steel so he could machine each part to exact spec. Sadly, Seymour passed away about two years later.
