It's Kind of Fun to do the Impossible Ken Leinbach

Ken is best known for his work to grow the Urban Ecology Center in Milwaukee. The Center's formula of using environmental education as a tool for inspiring urban revitalization transformed parts of Milwaukee.

Since recently turning leadership of the Urban Ecology Center over to a younger colleague, Ken is now launching, *In the Spirit of Kindness*, an incubator of projects put forth *in the spirit of kindness* that connect people to their inner purpose, each other, and the natural world. Striving to live with as little environmental impact as possible Ken chooses not to own a car and models the sharing of resources at the Hawk's Nest, a diverse intentional community he co-founded in Riverwest.

With contagious energy, Ken speaks on a number of topics ranging from the climate crisis and urban education to non-profit management and leadership. His favorite topic, and the one he plans to focus on at the January 15th luncheon, is about the power that comes from living from an attitude of abundance vs living from a position of scarcity.
